Articulation Process



Counselors will return to these middle schools to review forms with students. *Private and home school students must complete registration process with central registration.

*Encourage balance of challenging academics, courses of interest and extra curricular involvement. Students should get involved on our campus!

Credits are earned by passing a semester of a course. (Classes with an EOC will be awarded one full year credit only).

Students will have an official record, called a transcript, with unweighted and weighted grade point average (GPA) after the completion of one semester of a high school coursework. High school transcript is cumulative for credits and GPA.

<u>Unweighted</u> GPA is based on all courses awarded the standard grading of:

$$A = 4.0$$

$$B = 3.0$$

$$C = 2.0$$

$$D = 1.0$$

Weighted GPA is based on:

Honors and honors gifted courses awarded an extra .5 for a semester grade of a C or better. A = 4.5 B = 3.5 C = 2.5

Advanced Placement and dual enrollment courses are awarded an extra 1.0 for a semester grade of C or higher. A = 5.0 B = 4.0 C = 3.0

Graduation Requirements

- ACCEL 18 credit program

Standard 24 Credit Graduation Requirements

English – 4 credits

- Math 4 credits (to include Algebra I, and Geometry)
- Science 3 credits (to include Biology)
- Social Studies 3.5 credits (World History, Personal Finance, United States History, Economics and United States Government)
- Health Opportunities in Physical Education (HOPE) 1 credit
- Fine Art or DOE Approved Practical Art 1 credit
- Electives as needed for a total of 24 credits (8 credits)
- Earn a 2.0 cumulative unweighted GPA
- Reading Testing requirement Pass 10th Grade FAST/ELA Exam (reading)
- Math Testing Requirement Pass Algebra 1 EOC/BEST Test (math)



- Must take End Of Course Exams (EOC) for *Algebra I or Geometry and meet required score; must also EOC for Biology and US History.

Health Opportunities in Physical Education (HOPE)

- The Pre-AP program allows for acceleration in the social studies area.
 Students who participate in Pre-AP enroll in World History Honors the following year students can pursue Advanced Placement courses.
- The AP Accel program allows for acceleration in social studies. Students who participate in AP Accel begin taking Advanced Placement coursework in 9th grade. Those students enroll in Advanced Placement World History or Advanced Placement Human Geography. In addition, with prerequisites, have the option to enroll in AP Biology

Academic Scholars Award - Pro-rated per hour tuition coverage at a Florida post secondary institution.

<u>Requirements:</u> 3.5 weighted* GPA (16 required academic credits), and Qualifying SAT, ACT or CLT – TBD junior year and 100 hours of community service or 100 hours of work hours. (*Forms and Guidelines available on Chiles website – Guidance link*)

Florida Medallion Scholars Award - Pro-rated per hour tuition coverage at a Florida post secondary institution.

<u>Requirements:</u> 3.0 weighted* GPA (16 required academic credits) and Qualifying SAT, ACT or CLT TBD junior year and 75 hours of community service or 100 hours of work hours. (*Forms and Guidelines available on Chiles website – Guidance link*)

16 required academic credits include:

- 4 English
- 4 Math (Algebra I level and higher)
- 3 Science
- 3 Social Science
- 2 Foreign Language (in the same language)
- The SAT and ACT writing subtests will not be used for determining Bright Futures eligibility.
- Statewide Scholarship Weighting awards <u>.25 per semester</u> for honors, AP and DE courses with a "C" or higher. Advanced foreign language is not honors for BF.

Gold Seal Vocational Scholarship

Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholars Award - Pro-rated per hour tuition coverage for a vocational/technical program at a FL post secondary institution.

Requirements: 3.0 weighted GPA (16 required credits for graduation), 3.5 GPA in a 3 credit vocational program, 30 hours of community service or 100 hour of work hours, (Forms and Guidelines available on Chiles website – Guidance link) and a passing score on a college placement test (SAT- Reading-24, Writing/Language-25, Math- 24, , ACT 19 Reading, 17 English, 19 Math or PERT

(ESOL) English for Speakers of Other Languages

English for Speakers of Other Languages

The ESOL program is governed by State laws that comply with the Consent Decree, the legal framework for provision of services to students who speak a language other than English. Students are identified upon registration at their zoned school, and after initial screening on an English proficiency test. Leon County Schools (LCS) serves approximately 1000 **English Language Learners** (ELLs).

English Language Learners

Services to ELLs

- Annual individual meeting with Student and Parent to review Student Plan.
- Testing accommodations to include, small group testing and word to word dictionary in the student's native language.
- Yearly ESOL Program Parent and Student Dinner and Meeting with invited guests and Chiles support services for ELLs.

Section 504

- Eligibility is determined by conducting a 504 Evaluation at the school setting.
 - A documented physical or mental impairment is required for eligibility. Periodically, re-evaluations and/or plan reviews will be conducted as warranted. If your student is 504 eligible, their eligibility and/or accommodation plan will transition to high school.
 - Eligibility under Section 504 does not automatically qualify a student for an accommodation plan. This determination is made during the 504 Evaluation.
- SAT/ACT Testing Accommodations with 504's
 - Requests are typically submitted by the 504 Coordinator at the request of the student and parent. Consent to Release Information must be signed by a guardian prior to submitting the request.
 - SAT/ACT determine their criteria for allowable accommodations.
 Typically, the plan should be in place for four months or longer and the accommodations should be utilized in the classroom.

Research shows:



Research shows students who take AP courses and exams are more likely than their peers to attend college and graduate on time. Even AP Exam scores of 1 or 2 predict better college outcomes than academically similar college students who didn't take an AP course and exam.

Reasons to take AP:

- AP students learn essential time management and study skills needed for college and career success.
- They dig deeper into subjects that interest them and learn to tap their creativity and their problemsolving skills to address course challenges.
- Students who take AP courses send a signal to colleges that they're serious about their education and that they're willing to challenge themselves with rigorous coursework.
- Research shows that students who take AP courses and exams are much more likely than their peers to complete a college degree on time—which means they avoid paying for, for example, a fifth year of tuition.
