Course Descriptions

Guitar 1

Students with little or no experience develop basic guitar skills and knowledge, including simple and full-strum chords, strumming patterns, playing/singing simple melodies, foundational music theory, parts of the guitar, and ensemble skills. Beginning guitarists explore the careers and music of significant performers in pop/rock, jazz, blues, classical, country, bluegrass, and hard rock/metal genres. Public performances may serve as a culmination of specific instructional goals. Students may be required to attend and/or participate in rehearsals and performances outside the school day to support, extend, and assess learning in the classroom. This course may also require students to obtain a musical instrument (e.g., borrow, rent, purchase) from an outside source.

Guitar 2

Students with previous experience expand on basic guitar skills and knowledge, adding simple and full-strum chords, barre and power chords, and strumming patterns; adding more complex lead sheets and 1st-position chromatics; and building ensemble skills. Guitarists transfer between tablature and standard notation, study the work of significant musicians, and explore electric guitars, basses, and amplifiers. Public performances may serve as a culmination of specific instructional goals. Students may be required to attend and/or participate in rehearsals and performances outside the school day to support, extend, and assess learning in the classroom. This course may also require students to obtain a musical instrument (e.g., borrow, rent, purchase) from an outside source.

Guitar 3

Students with previous experience strengthen their guitar skills and knowledge, reviewing barre and power chords; adding strumming and finger-picking patterns; playing in 5th position; working with major scales; and building ensemble skills. Guitarists expand their tablature and standard-notation reading skills, add to their knowledge of significant musicians, and explore electric guitars, basses, and amplifiers. Public performances may serve as a culmination of specific instructional goals. Students may be required to attend and/or participate in rehearsals and performances outside the school day to support, extend, and assess learning in the classroom. This course may also require students to obtain a musical instrument (e.g., borrow, rent, purchase) from an outside source.

Parent Communication

<u>Class Rules</u>

- 1. Arrive on time
- 2. Bring all your materials
- 3. Be respectful to yourself, your teacher, your classmates
- 4. Participate

<u>Class Procedures</u>

1. Keep the room tidy.

Students are responsible for picking up their playing area after each rehearsal. All music, instruments, books and materials must be put away at the end of each class.

*All chairs, stands, and other equipment may not leave the guitar room without permission.

*All Instruments must be stored properly in a locker or on a shelf when not in use.

*Storage areas need to be kept clean from clutter, litter and personal items.

- 2. NO FOOD DRINKS OR GUM (except water)
- 3. Students may only leave the classroom with the teacher's permission. Use the proper procedure for leaving the room.
- 4. All electronics must be put away at all times unless directed otherwise by the teacher. (phones, laptops, etc.)

Discipline Plan

Discipline: Students are expected to follow all district, school, and classroom rules and procedures and always conduct themselves in an appropriate manner. Misbehavior will be dealt with in the following way:

- 1. Reminder
- 2. Verbal warning
- 3. Time out Students will complete the Corrective Sheet
- 4. The Teacher-Student Conference Form will be sent home. It should be signed by a parent and returned. Parents will be contacted via e-mail or phone.
- 5. The student will be referred to the administration.

<u>Severe Clause</u>: Immediate referral to the administration will result in cases of fighting, defiance (refusing to do what you have been asked to do), or extreme disrespect to classmates or teacher.

<u>Tardy Policy</u> – Each grading period, parents will be contacted after the second unexcused tardy. A referral will be written for the third unexcused tardy.

Grades will be posted on FOCUS and updated at least every two weeks. Grades will be based upon the following:

Pass-Offs/Tests/Concert Attendance 70% Participation/Written Assignments 30%

What do I need to know about instruments?

The guitars used in this class are owned by the school and will be properly handled and treated with care. If a student damages a school instrument, the student will be responsible for the cost of repairs and could forfeit all instrument privileges. Students may elect to bring their own classical or acoustic guitar to school for this class.

What do I need to know about participation?

- Students are expected to have their instrument, book, and pencil daily, and to remain on-task for the duration of the class in order to earn daily participation points. The highest level of performance can only be achieved through excellent rehearsals. Points will not be earned for inappropriate rehearsal behavior (excessive talking, not having music, etc.).
- Parents who wish to excuse their child from participation in class due to an illness or injury should notify Mrs. Dollar prior to the class they wish to have excused. An alternate method of participation will be assigned.

What do I need to know about written assignments?

Students will have some written assignments to complete such as definitions of musical terms, benchmark assignments, practice assignments, music theory and music history.

What do I need to know about progress?

The keys to progress include quality teacher instruction and correct repetition of that instruction. The most common hindrances to steady progress are lack of practice, practice with improper technique, and insufficient correct repetitions.

What do I need to know about practice?

Students should practice with a specific goal in mind. Students should use specific strategies to help them meet the goal. Goals and strategies will be covered in class.

What is a pass-off?

Students will "pass-off" selected sections of music – sing the selection for Mrs. Dollar. In this way, the teacher can be sure that each student is receiving individualized instruction. Pass-offs should be completed on time for full credit.

What do I need to know about tests and concert attendance?

Playing tests will be given to evaluate students' progress. These tests may include technique, scales, etudes and music literature. Written tests over musical terms, music theory and music history may be given. Since guitar is a performance-based class, <u>all performances will be mandatory</u>, and will count toward the academic grade.

- The main performances will be: Fall Concert, Winter Concert, and Spring Concert.
- There may be additional concerts during the school year. All information concerning performances will be announced as soon as it becomes final.
- Attendance at all concerts, rehearsals, and sectionals is REQUIRED. These activities are considered co-curricular because they are extensions of daily classroom activities. Grades are given for these activities.
- No makeup assignment can substitute for the experience of participating in a live concert. This is the main focus of our class. Please make every effort to attend.
- If a student is absent from a concert due to illness, death in the family, or a family emergency, the absence will be excused.
- A letter from their parent should be submitted to Mrs. Dollar on the next school day the student is in attendance.

- <u>Parents should fill out the "Notice of Absence Form" at least one week before</u> the concert if their child will be absent for any other reason. You will find a copy of this form on Mrs. Dollar's website.
- If a student is absent from a concert with no excuse, they will earn a "0" for that concert grade.
- Students who have an excused absence from the concert must submit an alternate assignment to receive credit.

Examples of Unexcused Absences

I didn't know, I had too much homework, I can't get a ride, I forgot, I had something else to do.

<u>Concert Clean Up</u> – Students are required to remain after the concert to help with cleaning up. Each student must sign out with the director before leaving. Participation in clean-up activities will count toward the students' grade for the concert.

Concert Etiquette

Concerts are very important to our students. They work very hard to prepare. It is important that students are allowed to perform in a true concert setting, and that parents are allowed to see and hear their child perform with minimal distractions. Therefore, we respectfully request that the audience (including students who aren't performing) observe the following:

- Please sit quietly through the entire concert, if possible.
- Please do not enter or exit the performance area while the ensemble is performing.
- Please do not talk or move around the room while the ensemble is performing.
- Please do not use cell phones during the concert.
- The appropriate way to show appreciation is clapping. Yelling and whistling are not considered polite.

Private Lessons

Private lessons taught by a specialist are highly encouraged. They are invaluable for working on fundamentals of posture, building technique, preparing for auditions, etc. In order for music instruction to be effective, it should occur regularly. The standard lesson time for beginners is 30 minutes. More advanced students need a minimum of 45-60 minutes per lesson. Please ask Mrs. Dollar for a list of instructors, if you are interested in private lessons.

Concert Attire

Black shirt, black pants (no jeans, no sweatpants, no yoga/stretch pants), black shoes

<u>T-Shirts</u>

If enough students are interested, we will order Guitar t-shirts. These are optional. They may be worn on the day of each concert, on Fridays, for pep rallies, auditions, and any guitar field trips.

Guitar Field Trips

The guitar class may participate in various trips during the school year. Please note the following:

- All school rules apply on all guitar trips (including dress code).
- Students must attend all mandatory concerts in order to go on any guitar trip.
- Students must maintain a "B" average in guitar and at least a "3" in guitar conduct in order to perform on any guitar field trip.
- If transportation is provided for an away performance, all students are expected to travel to and from the event on the transportation provided.
- Students are encouraged to leave personal electronic devices at home. However, they may bring them at their own risk.
- Students with a referral will lose the privilege of participating in trips and activities.
- All medications must be turned in with directions to the director. Students may not carry medications.

Money Collection

- There is no fee associated with Deerlake Guitar. From time to time, money will be collected for expenses such as application fees or transportation for a field trip. Please let Mrs. Dollar know if other arrangements need to be made due to financial hardship.
- Money which has been collected for a guitar trip is not refundable after it has been submitted to the vendor.

Fund-Raising Activities

From time to time, fund-raising events will be scheduled to cover expenses such as student awards, sheet music, instruments, etc. Each guitar member will be encouraged, not required, to participate. This money will be used to benefit our students. If more money is collected than is needed to cover expenses for this year, the balance may carry over to help with next year's expenses.
