1. transmitter [Noun]
Sentence: The transmitter beamed out a radio signal.
Definition: device that broadcasts electromagnetic waves
2. iconic [Adjective]
Sentence: The iconic athlete exemplified sportsmanship.
Definition: exemplary, well-known and recognizable
Synonyms: legendary, exemplary
3. nocturnal [Adjective]
Sentence: Nocturnal animals are active at night.
Definition: active at night
4. burrows [Verb]
Sentence: A mole burrows deep into the ground.
Definition: digs or makes a passage in the ground
Antonyms: buries, covers
Synonyms: digs, tunnels
5. fragmented [Verb]
Sentence: The rock fragmented into large chunks.
Definition: broke into pieces or segments
Antonyms: combined
Synonyms: broke, shattered, divided, separated
6. logical [Adjective]
Sentence: The science officer is rational and logical.
Definition: reasonable or using reason and rationality
Antonyms: unreasonable, illogical
Synonyms: reasonable
7. inoffensive [Adjective]
Sentence: An inoffensive joke does not demean anyone.
Definition: not causing objection or injury

Antonyms: offensive, objectionable

Synonyms: harmless

8. irrational [Adjective]

Sentence: Her irrational behavior made no sense.

Definition: without sense, good judgment, or reason

Antonyms: rational

9. probable [Adjective]

Sentence: Its probable that it will be hot in July.

Definition: likely to happen

Antonyms: unexpected, unlikely

Synonyms: expected, likely,

10. legal [Adjective]

Sentence: It is not legal to break the law.

Definition: conforming to or gaining authority from law

Antonyms: illegal, unlawful

Synonyms: lawful

11. adequate [Adjective]

Sentence: His passing grade is adequate but not great.

Definition: good enough for what you need

Antonyms: inadequate, insufficient

Synonyms: enough, sufficient, fine

12. offensive [Adjective]

Sentence: His rude comments are offensive and hurtful.

Definition: insulting, hurtful, or disgusting

Synonyms: insulting, hurtful, disgusting

13. irreplaceable [Adjective]

Sentence: Her one-of-a-kind jewels were irreplaceable.

Definition: having no possible substitute

Antonyms: replaceable

Synonyms: unreplaceable, indispensable

14. inaccurate [Adjective]

Sentence: The inaccurate address was not correct.

Definition: not accurate; incorrect or untrue

Antonyms: correct, true

Synonyms: inexact, incorrect

15. illogical [Adjective]

Sentence: The idea was illogical and made no sense.

Definition: not sensible or reasonable

Antonyms: logical, rational, sensible, valid, sound

Synonyms: irrational, faulty, invalid, unsound

16. accurate [Adjective]

Sentence: A broken scale can't give an accurate weight.

Definition: correct or true in every detail

Antonyms: incorrect, false, inaccurate, erroneous, wrong

Synonyms: correct, precise, exact, true, right

17. impassable [Adjective]

Sentence: The flooded road is blocked and impassable.

Definition: impossible to travel along or through

Antonyms: passable, open

Synonyms: blocked, obstructed

18. inadequate [Adjective]

Sentence: His quick apology was sorely inadequate.

Definition: not good enough for a particular purpose

Antonyms: adequate, enough

Synonyms: insufficient

19. mobile [Adjective]

Sentence: A mobile home may be moved from place to place.

Definition: able to be moved

Antonyms: immobile

Synonyms: movable

20. improbable [Noun]

Sentence: Snow is improbable and unlikely on a hot day.

Definition: not likely to happen

Antonyms: probable, believable

Synonyms: unbelievable, unlikely, doubtful

21. rational [Adjective]

Sentence: I was calm and rational during the crisis.

Definition: having and using good judgment and reasoning

Antonyms: irrational

Synonyms: levelheaded

22. illegal [Adjective]

Sentence: He broke the law by doing something illegal.

Definition: against the law

Antonyms: legal, allowed

Synonyms: forbidden, banned, prohibited

23. passable [Adjective]

Sentence: Her poor grades were barely passable.

Definition: just good enough to be acceptable; adequate

Synonyms: adequate

24. replaceable [Adjective]

Sentence: The bulb's replaceable, so just buy a new one.

Definition: able to find a substitute for

Antonyms: irreplaceable

25. immobile [Adjective]

Sentence: A cast kept my arm immobile so it could heal.

Definition: unable to move or be moved

Antonyms: movable, mobile

Synonyms: unmovable, stationary, still

26. illumination [Verb]

Sentence: The only illumination came from a candle flame.

Definition: source of light

Synonyms: light

27. inefficiency [Noun]

Sentence: The incompetent's results show his inefficiency.

Definition: an inability to produce results with competency

Antonyms: efficiency

28. inexplicable [Adjective]

Sentence: Her mysterious disappearance is inexplicable.

Definition: not able to be accounted for or understood

Antonyms: explicable, comprehensible

Synonyms: uncomprehensible, unexplained

29. expert [Noun]

Sentence: The chess expert has mastered the game.

Definition: one with experience and skill in something

Antonyms: amateur

Synonyms: master, specialist

30. focus [Verb]

Sentence: Focus on the letters on the eye chart.

Definition: to give all of your attention to a particular person or thing

31. visible [Adjective]

Sentence: His scar faded and was no longer visible.

Definition: able to be seen or perceived

Antonyms: invisible, unnoticeable

Synonyms: perceivable, noticeable

32. relate [Verb]

Sentence: We relate because we have similar views.

Definition: connect in meaning, emotion, or thought

Antonyms: clash, disagree

Synonyms: connect, understand, empathize

33. detect [Verb]

Sentence: A motion sensor can detect movement.

Definition: sense, find or discover something

Synonyms: find, discover, sense, notice
