Definition: relating to a pleasing tune

Synonyms: harmonious

3. retired [Verb]

Definition: extremely great Antonyms: ordinary, common Synonyms: pleasing, wonderful

8. enormous [Adjective]

Definition: very large, gigantic

Antonyms: small, tiny, minute, little

Synonyms: huge, gigantic, massive, tremendous

9. ridiculous [Adjective]

Definition: absolutely silly and nonsensical Antonyms: sensible, serious, rational, logical

Synonyms: ludicrous, nonsensical, preposterous, absurd

10. humorous [Adjective]

Definition: funny or amusing

Antonyms: serious

Synonyms: funny, amusing, silly

11. numerous [Adjective]

Sentence: The many flies were too numerous to count.

Definition: being very many in number

Antonyms: few, little

Synonyms: abundant, many

12. adventurous [Adjective]

Sentence: An explorer must have an adventurous spirit. Definition: ready to undertake new or risky experiences

Antonyms: wary, cautious Synonyms: bold, daring

13. curious [Adjective]

Sentence: I am curious to find out your secret.

Definition: eager to find out something

Antonyms: uninterested

Synonyms: inquisitive, interested, wondering

Sentence: My previous job was better than my new job. Definition: existing or occurring before, in time or order

Synonyms: preceding, prior

19. precious [Adjective]

Sentence: My beloved dog is precious to me.

Definition: greatly loved or treasured

Synonyms: cherished, beloved

20. vicious [Adjective]

Sentence: Say nice things and make no vicious remarks.

Definition: mean, evil, ferocious Antonyms: sweet, docile, nice Synonyms: mean, evil, ferocious

21. suspicious [Adjective]

Sentence: His odd behavior makes me suspicious of him. Definition: having doubt or lacking trust; wary of uncertain
