1. provisions [Noun]
Sentence: I've stocked up on food and other provisions.
Definition: a stock of necessary supplies
Synonyms: supplies
2. terrain [Noun]
Sentence: The terrain on the trail was rocky.
Definition: an area of land or its surface features
Synonyms: land, ground, territory
3. settlement [Noun]
Sentence: Pioneers established a settlement in the West.
Definition: town or region newly populated
Synonyms: colony
4. bandits [Noun]
Sentence: A group of bandits robbed the bank.
Definition: robbers or thieves
Synonyms: robbers, thieves, burglars
5. oblige [Verb]
Sentence: If you need help, I am happy to oblige.
Definition: to help or assist someone with something
Synonyms: help, assist
6. audio [Adjective]
Sentence: We fixed the audio signal so we could hear.
Definition: having to do with sound
Synonyms: sound
7. audience [Noun]
Sentence: A large audience of people saw the movie.
Definition: a group of people attending a performance
Synonyms: crowd, public

8. audit [Verb]
Sentence: Accountants audit financial records.
Definition: to check financial accounts for accuracy
Synonyms: inspect, review
9. audition [Noun]
Sentence: His audition for the play earned him a role.
Definition: a tryout for a role in a play or performance
Synonyms: tryout
10. auditory [Adjective]
Sentence: The ear's auditory nerves help you to hear.
Definition: of or relating to the sense of hearing
11. auditorium [Noun]
Sentence: Rows of seats face a stage in an auditorium.
Definition: a large room used for presentations
Synonyms: theater
12. bankrupt [Adjective]
Sentence: He was penniless and bankrupt.
Definition: lacking in money or valuable qualities
Antonyms: wealthy
Synonyms: insolvent, broke
13. disruptive [Adjective]
Sentence: The disruptive student interrupted the class.
Definition: causing interruption or disorder
Antonyms: facilitative
14. disruption [Noun]
Sentence: Power outages cause disruption in electricity.
Definition: an interruption
Antonyms: continuance
Synonyms: break, separation, interruption
15. rupture [Verb]
Sentence: The weak pipe may rupture from the pressure.

Definition: to break, burst, or explode

Antonyms: hold, keep, contain

Synonyms: break, burst, explode

16. scribble [Verb]

Sentence: No one can read your writing if you scribble.

Definition: write too quickly or messily

Synonyms: scrawl, scratch

17. script [Noun]

Sentence: The actors read their lines from a script.

Definition: written text of a play or movie

Synonyms: text

18. inscription [Noun]

Sentence: An inscription on the coin indicates its age.

Definition: a marking, such as engraved words

Synonyms: marking, engraving, legend

19. transcribe [Verb]

Sentence: Transcribe the lectures into written form.

Definition: to make a written copy of something

Synonyms: reproduce, transfer, translate, record

20. spectacle [Noun]

Sentence: The fireworks spectacle awed the crowd.

Definition: an unusual sight or public display

Synonyms: exhibition, scene, extravaganza, marvel

21. spectator [Noun]

Sentence: A spectator is someone who watches an event.

Definition: one who watches an event

Antonyms: participant, player

Synonyms: watcher, observer, witness

22. prospect [Noun]

Sentence: Dark clouds indicate rain is a likely prospect.

Definition: possibility, future outcome or potentiality

Synonyms: expectation, likelihood, possibility, potentiality

23. retrospective [Noun]
Sentence: The exhibit is a retrospective of all my work.
Definition: an exhibit of an artist's life's work
24. speculate [Verb]
Sentence: I speculate that he lied but have no proof.
Definition: form a theory or conjecture without evidence
Antonyms: know
Synonyms: conjecture, suspect, theorize
25. inspection [Noun]
Sentence: Only good quality meat passes inspection.
Definition: careful examination or scrutiny of something
Synonyms: scrutiny, examination
26. audiologist [Noun]
Sentence: The audiologist listened for hearing defects.
Definition: someone who studies hearing disorders
27. circumscribe [Verb]
Sentence: A moat will circumscribe the castle.
Definition: to confine within a boundary, enclose
Antonyms: open, free
Synonyms: surround, confine
28. introspection [Noun]
Sentence: Introspection is self-contemplation.
Definition: contemplation of one's inner thoughts
Synonyms: self-examination, contemplation
29. limitation [Noun]
Sentence: All bridges have a weight limitation.
Definition: imposed restriction; characteristic weakness
Synonyms: restraint, limit, budget, weakness
30. grace [Noun]
Sentence: He walked with a dancer's elegance and grace.
Definition: elegance, effortless movement

Antonyms: clumsiness, awkwardness

Synonyms: elegance

31. noble [Adjective]

Sentence: Her noble acts were rewarded with a medal.

Definition: showing or possessing an elevated character

Antonyms: ignoble, selfish

Synonyms: idealistic, grand, magnanimous, selfless

32. empower [Verb]

Sentence: Getting a license will empower me to drive.

Definition: make able or allow to do something

Antonyms: disallow

Synonyms: entitle, allow

33. resist [Verb]

Sentence: The desire to eat candy was hard to resist.

Definition: to fight against or keep away from

Antonyms: welcome, embrace, accept

Synonyms: oppose, fight, defy, combat, curb
