


# Nativism and the Klan

The "new" Klan targeted African Americans, Catholics, Jews, Immigrants, and any other group deemed "un-American."





#### **Immigration Quotas**

**Emergency Quota Act**: restricted annual admission to the US by ethnic group.

**National Origins Act**: made immigration restrictions a permanent policy.

- Quota of 2% of each national group represented in the US Census of 1890.
- Before a large wave of Catholic and Jewish immigration from southern and eastern Europe.
- These quotas heavily favored immigrants from northwestern Europe.



## Increasing Mexican Immigration

 Employers still wanted cheap labor for agriculture, mining, and railroad work.

The National Origins Act exempted peoples from the Western Hemisphere so,

By the end of the 1920s, nearly 700,000 Mexicans had migrated to the United States.



#### Professional Women

Women made major contributions in science, medicine, law, and literature.

Margaret Sanger believed families could improve their standard of living by limiting the # of children they had

The American Birth Control League promoted knowledge about birth control.



#### Religious Fundamentalism

- The new "morality" of the 1920s was embraced by some but others feared that the country was losing its traditional values.
- Moral Decline




# Fundamentalists & Evolution

REJECTED Darwin's theory of Evolution

 Human beings developed from lower forms of life over millions of years.


Creationism: belief that God created the world as described in the Bible.



#### The Scopes Trial

Tennessee (1925) outlawed any teaching that

- Denied "the story of the Divine Creation of man as taught in the Bible." OR
- 2. Promoted the idea that man descended from a lower form of animals.

#### **Scopes Trial**

The American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) looked for a teacher to test the validity of this Act.

**John T. Scopes**, biology teacher in Dayton, Tennessee.

#### **Monkey Trial**

- Scopes was found guilty and fined \$100.
- Trial broadcast over the radio.
- Darrow's cross-examination of William Jennings Bryan hurt the Fundamentalist cause.
