
Chaires Elementary School Vision








COLLECTION DEVELOPMENT PLAN CYCLE

KNOWLEDGE OF THE COMMUNITY

Chaires Elementary serves 478 students enrolled in grades pre-k through 5th. The student population's ethnicity is made of 6.6% Hispanic and 93.4% Non-Hispanic students. Additionally, we serve a diverse population made up of 57.3 White %, 41.4 Black %, 2 Native %, 1.2 Asian %, 0.06 Pacific %, and 0 Multicultural % students.

The administration includes Principal, Richard Holmes, and Assistant Principal, Brooks Sperling. Chaires Elementary is proud to offer many special programs which provide students with opportunities. These include news club, honor chorus, STEM club, safety patrol, and student government association.

Collection Analysis

A thorough analysis of the current media center collection at Chaires Elementary indicates that the average age of the collection is 2009 and the number of books per student is 17.3 The American Association for School Libraries has established a criterion for highly effective media center that includes a ratio of 15-20 books available per student in the collection.

At this time, Chaires Elementary does meet the recommended standards for the number of books per student. The collection is developed for and influenced by students, their interests, academic needs and alignment to the curriculum. The data below is a snapshot of the collection based on a Titlewise Analysis.

The analysis of the collection also revealed the following areas of strengths and concerns

- Strengths include: number of graphic novels in the collection and age of the philosophy and psychology book collections
- Areas of concern include: non-fiction collection in the areas of science, systems data/computers, and commerce, communication, and transportation



Representation Analysis

To deepen focus on strategic collection development, specific sections of the collection were analyzed in detail to determine whether the media center collection reflects and represents various points of view and experiences. The goal is to provide a balanced collection that can be both a mirror, to reflect a reader's experience, and a window, so readers can experience different viewpoints.

Results

Based on the available school data of Chaires Elementary School in comparison to Collection Analysis results, it was found that:

Needs Assessment

Online surveys were made available to faculty and staff during April 2023. Staff received an email and email reminders encouraging them to complete their surveys. A total of 13 completed surveys were completed by the faculty and staff. The surveys expressed a need for improved learning opportunities, communication, collaboration, and resources. These developed into the goals: 1. Review schedule to add more flexibility to library access, 2. Create time to form more collaborative relationships between teachers and media specialist, 3. Research, review, and purchase more resources in the form of B.E.S.T. book collections and class book sets.



Materials Selection

Chaires Elementary library media center is under the umbrella of the Leon County Schools district library program which in turn, follows requirements laid out by Florida law for library media centers and instructional materials.

Per <u>FS 1006.28.6(d)2.a-d</u> and LCS <u>po2520</u>, the guidelines below are general standards by which to review and select materials to meet the needs of your students, faculty, and staff.

Materials considered for purchase are selected on the basis of the following criteria. The materials must be:

Effort should be made to keep the media current, comprehensive, and include media that reflects rapidly developing instructional technologies.

After analyzing the Chaires Elementary library media collection, the following areas have been selected as the primary areas of emphasis for materials selection for the 2024-2025 school year.

Area 1: Non-fiction/research sources

Area 2: Completing series

Area 3: B.E.S.T. book collections for K-2

Acquisition, Processing, and Maintenance

Acquisitions Procedures in School Libraries

Because our school library media centers have only one school library media specialist, that individual is responsible for creating a collection to support instruction, literacy, and students' recreational reading. Materials selection policies generally mandate that the library professional seek input from teachers, other professional staff, and students. School library media specialists are also responsible for weeding or de-selecting collection materials following policy guidelines as well as making a decision as to whether gift items will be accepted.



Example: School Library Acquisitions Procedures

- In selecting learning resources, professional personnel will evaluate available resources and curriculum needs and will consult reputable, professionally prepared aids to selection, and other appropriate sources. The actual resource will be examined whenever possible.
- Recommendations for purchase involve administrators, teachers, students, district personnel, and community members, as appropriate.
- Gift materials shall be judged by the selection criteria and shall be accepted or rejected by those criteria.
- Selection is an ongoing process that should include removing materials that are no longer used or needed, adding materials, and replacing lost and worn materials that still have educational value.

Circulation

Circulation guidelines and procedures for Chaires Elementary School

Currently students select the reading materials of their choice. Kindergarten and first grade select from easy readers, early non-fiction, and the picture book collection. Second grade may select from easy readers, early non-fiction, picture book collection, transitional chapter books, graphic novels, and general non-fiction as appropriate. Third through fifth grade may select books from any section of the library, including those listed above, graphic novels and general fiction. Items allowed by grade level are as follows: k-1 one item, 2-3 two items, and 4-5 three items. Exceptions are made during research units. Research books are not counted as part of the regular checkout allowance until the project is completed.

Either the media specialist or a media volunteer provides assistance to students with check-out. There is an independent computer set up for book return. Students in all grades scan and return their own books, gaining assistance as needed. Books are removed from the book drip, organized, and reshelved in the appropriate area of the library. Currently the media specialist does not have an established assistant and teaches grades 3,4, and 5 daily which the students have access to the media center for 45 minutes once a week. For grades K, 1, and 2 a 25-minute self-selected read-aloud and checkout day once a week is provided, however, not mandatory.

If a student indicates that they have lost a book, they are encouraged to look for the book. After two weeks, the book is placed in 'lost' status allowing for it to return to the catalog if found. The student is not charged for the lost book, however, if their parent/guardian voluntarily provides payment or a replacement book, that is accepted. If lost books is a continuous issue with a particular student, the student is expected to leave their checked out book(s) at school and provided an opportunity to get books for home from the school's little fee library, via library book giveaways, or the book vending machine to ensure for reading material for home.
